M B Moore, Morgan, Kentucky. I have never had originals by Mr Moore and have found these samples in a package of other items. Mr. Moore was born in 1867 and died January 14, 1922 in Falmouth, Kentucky.

M C Leipholtz, I think of the Philadelphia, Pa area. Mr. Leipholtz attended the Zanerian College of Penmanship in Columbus, Ohio and sent these items to Earl A Lupfer his teacher: 4 items of ornamental penmanship; 4 more items of ornamental penmanship, an 8 1/2 X 11 letter to Mr, Lupfer reciting in poetic form his knowledge and admiration of C P Zaner, the school and Mr. Lupfer.

J E Lester of Wapella and Vandalia, Illinois. Items include: page dated 1946, envelope dated 1946, envelope dated 1947, other items were enclosed in the various envelopes.

Items of original and printed samples of ornamental penmanship by Clyde C Lister, Maxwell Training School, Brooklyn, New York. Items include original business writing sample, 1906, 5 X 12 inches; original ornamental alphabet, 1906, 5 X 12 inches; 7 original envelopes dated 1925-1929 in fantastic business penmanship; about 20 pages of cuts from penmanship magazines of lessons prepared by Lister for publication in Zaner and Bloser magazines

The first president of IAMPTH was Rene Guillard. He taught in the Evanston, Illinois school system. He was an admirer of the work of all penmen of the early 1900's, took personal lessons from L. Madarasz and spent a lifetime in penmanship. He had some quirky designs, not in compliance with established rules of the Zanerian His death was sad 'They' meaning the people who found Rene and his wife, found them both dead in their apartment after several days.

Jasper G. Cross

After the move to Naperville, in the fall of 1871, Jasper G. Cross joined the faculty of North Western College as the head of the Commerce Department.

Cross was born in New York State in 1835 and moved with his parents to Illinois at a young age. He taught in the public schools and became an ordained Methodist minister. He was affiliated with the Jennings Institute in Aurora, where he later established the Aurora Commercial College.

He became known for his mastery of ornamental penmanship and pen drawing as a form of art. He also became famous as the founder of the "Eclectic System" of shorthand.

Two departments at North Western were organized by Professor Cross- the Department of Business and the Department of Fine Arts.

Cross left the college for a position in Southern California University in 1879.
